

# Formation of the Programme Team

With immense and imminent growth of KMWSC (Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre), a team is required which would assist the Director in functioning of the organization. # **Milestones**

# **Bravery Award**

Ms Ananya Chakraborti, Honourable Chairperson of the West Bengal Commission for the protection of Child Rights (WBCPCR) felicitated the 3 child leaders - Aritra Sarkar from the sensitization of Communities and Adolescents at Risk: to combat human trafficking and the child abuse project, Monisha Sarkar and Alamin Sardar, both, from the Surakhit Saisav Project, with the Bravery Award from the WBCPCR team.

- Aritra Sarkar 17 year old, child parliament leader was awarded for his role in saving two gravely injured people and taking them to the nearest hospital. Artira took care of the accident victims till their families joined him.
- Monisha Sarkar, a 13 year old child club member helped rescue a child from the chains of being a child labour.
- Alamin Sardar, aged 15, a child club member reached out to the KMWSC team to help a starving kid whose mother was so unwell that she was unable to earn or arrange food for them.
   Alamin, also, intervened to stop a child marriage in his village by sharing the information with the KMWSC team.







# **Opening Piggy Bank**

Itinda child club members decided to start their own piggy bank with their pocket money by taking inspiration from other child clubs. With that collection, they would be a part of serving the community people. On 23rd March, the opening ceremony of the Piggy Bank scheme took place in their village, which was a mammoth step forward in community service.





# Distribution programmes from the fund of Piggy Bank money

The child club members of Basirhat Block-1 took the initiative in 2020 to help the community people in their locality and till date they continue with this practice. During the lockdown period when many of the villagers lost their work, and did not have access to regular food, many of the child club leaders and members decided to do something for them.

The child club members started to save their own pocket money and they made a piggy bank for the community. After gathering all the money, they saved it in the Piggy Bank.

With that fund, they arranged for food distribution programmes at many places. The child club members brought and packed the food themselves. With a ripple effect of this initiative, several other initiatives were taken up like the distribution of clothes and blankets to the villagers. They are continuing with this practice with the help of the child protection workers and are deeply encouraged by the inspiration gained from KMWSC. In the year 2021, many child club members started with many such programmes, keeping to all the safety precautions for Covid 19, in their villages. During the lockdown period Kamardanga child club collected clothes from the community and re-distributed them to people in need like the ones by Merudandi Child Club & Mukundokati child club.



# **Empowerment and Leadership for Survivors' Programme**

Under the anti-human trafficking project, the project team identified the growing need for survivors' intervention. Hence the anti-human trafficking project was re-designed to incorporate the Empowerment and Leadership for Survivors' programme at the Basirhat Indo-Bangladesh Border.

**Definition of Survivors as per the project:** The term survivor often refers to an individual who is going or has gone through the recovery process. Additionally this word is used when discussing the short and long term effects of violence and sexual violence.

Thus, under the Empowerment and Leadership for Survivors' programme, two survivor groups were formed consisting of Trafficking Survivors, Gender Base Violence Survivors, Domestic Violence Survivors and Sexual Abuse Survivors. These groups are covered under a holistic approach through educational support, skill development support, legal aid support, livelihood and mental health support through counselling sessions and capacity building training. The project team focusses on networking and advocacy with government stakeholders and law enforcement wings along with rescue and rehabilitation departments.

# **Loreto Rainbow Teacher's Training**

KMWSC was privileged to provide training to the teachers of the Loreto Rainbow Homes under the Barefoot Teachers Training programme on 23rd & 24th February, 2022. This was the first part of the Level-I training for the grass-root level teachers. 16 teachers from the Loreto Rainbow Homes at Sealdah, Entally, Bowbazar, Loreto House and Bansdroni attended the programme. The short introduction was followed by the ice breaking session. The topics - UNCRC, Child Rights, Right to Education were covered in great details. During the 2 days, other topics like phonic, pre-writing skills, action rhymes were also taken up. Difference between equity & equality, importance of mother tongue in learning were discussed as well. The training was imparted through audio video sessions and fun activities.









In continuation to the February modules, further 2 days of Level-1 Barefoot Teacher Training for teachers of Loreto Rainbow Homes were conducted on 23rd and 24th March 2022. Among the topics covered, were lesson plans, art & craft preparation on numerals, TLM preparation on numbers and action rhymes on counting, laws and acts related to Child Rights & Child Protection, Right to Education were also covered. Certificates were handed over to all the participants at the end of the training.



The KMWSC is humbled and grateful to her, not only for the kind words but also for taking time out from her busy schedule to meet them.

**Brickfield School Project** 

The Brickfield School Project aims to provide education to children of inter-state and intra-state migrant workers, who migrate along with their families (including children), to brickfields of West Bengal in search of livelihood. During their stay at the brickfields, the children are deprived of educational opportunities. The project aims not only to provide education to these children at the brickfields but also to mainstream them into government educational institutions when they return to their homes, termed as "source area". The project also provides basic healthcare and medical check-up facilities to the migrant families during their stay at the brickfields.






# Providing Education & Protection to Vulnerable Children at Redlight Area

# - Sonagachi

The COVID-19 crisis has brought unprecedented challenges for millions of people around the world. Despite being termed the 'great equaliser,' the pandemic has disproportionately impacted marginalised communities across the world. Among these communities, the sex workers' community was hit badly. Thus, the sex workers in India were left to fend for themselves, leaving them more vulnerable, than before, the pandemic.

Cramped in brothels, sex workers are usually migrants with insecure legal and residency status and face significant challenges in accessing health services or financial relief, which exacerbates their vulnerability.

The co-occurrence of cyclone Yaas during the second wave in 2020 had been disastrous as the sex workers had to simultaneously deal with the ongoing pandemic and the aftermath of a natural disaster which deeply and adversly affected them economically.



# **New Initiative**

- With the involvement of children, child friendly corner was designed inside the Sonagachi MAC centre where the kids took the initiative to hold brush and scissors to make the centre look attractive and highlighted child safety information.
- Library corner: Many children at Sonagchi failed to buy additional references and guide books while preparing for their class X and XII boards. Hence as per the syllabii, Hindi, English and Bengali books were added in the centre which can be availed by the kids by using their library card.



# **Lotus Child Project**

This project focussed on bridging the gap between poverty, education and development. It made sure that the underprivileged students got access to quality education in order to develop their future as per their choice. Remedial classes were initiated for the enrolled students. These classes helped the children in need, to learn new aspects and get proper education. Basic health and hygiene kits for the beneficiaries, awareness on protection from social issues including; child marriage, human trafficking, child labour were the main aspects of the project.

# **Hidden Domestic Child Labour**

This project is to weed out, all forms of child labour that are socially and culturally unacceptable in Kolkata; enabling children to withdraw from the child labour force and mainstream them into formal/open schools or provide them opportunities for alternative livelihood to live a dignified life. The aim is to ensure, quality education for the excluded children; give them basic education; tutorial support and prepare them in Multi Purpose Activities Centres (MACs) in order to be admitted into formal eradicating schools; inequality in educational opportunities irrespective of caste, creed, gender and language especially for children with disabilities. The project focusses to mainstream the children (6 to 14 years) into formal schools, enrol (15-18 years) in open schools and to provide life skill education and recreational activities to the children in multi purpose activities centres.

# **Anti Human Trafficking Project**


As per the Crimes in India Statistics, 2019 issued by the Ministry of Home Affairs, a total of **2,260 cases** of human trafficking were registered in 2019 compared to 2,278 cases in 2018.

There are commonly occurring during economic and social challenges that make the economically backward communities more vulnerable to trafficking. Thus, due to Covid-19, the vulnerability multiplied. Chronic Poverty, unemployment, the lure of a better life, social discrimination, domestic violence, child marriage, substance and sexual abuse were some factors that have been found to increase the vulnerability of the target beneficiaries of the project.

The objective of the project was to create safety net in the local community to combat trafficking and on women and child safety issues like sexual abuse, child marriage, violation of basic rights etc.



# Surokhit Shaishav - Child Rights Project

Surokhit Shaishav-(Safe Childhood- Child Rights) project is in its 3rd year of continuation and in 20 villages under Basirhat Block-1 near the Indo Bangladesh border since October 2019. Being the border villages, the lives of children are at risk. During the last 2 years and 3 months of intervention in 20 villages through community awareness & mass sensitization campaigns, auto campaigns on child labour, capacity building programmes, formation of child clubs, periodic leadership training and workshops, formation of CBOs such as Mothers Collectives, strengthening the child friendly police station, VLCPC, VEC, SMCs, home visits, guardians meet, networking and advocacy with the local governing body-CWC, DSWO,







largely the village people and has brought a change in the mind set of children and community people, at large. Many children are trafficked into Bangladesh for slavery, forced labour and flesh trade in the redlight areas. The ignorance, the lack of knowledge and awareness among the villagers lead to social issues. The violation of child rights and protection issues were very common at the intervention areas before we started the commencement of project. Very few people knew about the rights of children and why protection of children was needed. They did not even know that children have rights to live a secure, healthy and safe life. Child labour, child trafficking, early marriage, early pregnancy, pre-natal deaths were very common due to under age marriages of children. The sexual harassment and abuses were also a threat for children in those border villages.

Awareness campaigns on covid 19, child rights, child protection issues, covid vaccine through toto miking
 No. of Activities: 4

Outcome: Awareness campaign was conducted to make the community people aware of the various issues through auto-miking.

- Villagers came to know about the safety measures of covid-19 and what would be the plan of action if one had the symptoms
- As a result of the awareness campaigns, more than 85% children (14-18 years) got vaccines in 20 villages under Basirhat Block-1.

## **Lodha Community Project**

It is a tribal based community programme for the socially, economically backward families who are still considered untouchables in the society. During the last 7 years of intervention in the Lodha community through community awareness & sensitization campaigns, capacity building programmes, medical check up camps, alternative livelihood options for Lodha people, home visits, guardians meet, networking and advocacy with the local governing body, the project has impacted the lives of the Lodhas people largely and has brought a change in the mind set of the Lodha

- They are now coming forward to claim the benefits of government schemes available in the panchayat and at hospitals in the districts.
- · Lactating mothers are now going to government hospitals to avail the facilities for pregnant women.
- As a result of networking with local panchayat members, some development work for the Lodha community is under way:
  - o the local administration constructed a concrete pathway the road up to the from the main road to the centre.
  - o Installed pipe lines for the supply of drinking water in the centre for the children.
  - o The drinking water pipe line was also connected to the Lodha households.
- 15 children from the Lodha community have benefitted from the hostel facilities when, after lockdown ,they returned back to the hostel.
- Each member was helped to obtain their respective legal documents.
- The men folk went to work after they received the legal documents.
- Few mothers took the lead role and helped the teachers in every activity of the project.







- Self help group was formed in the community, consisting of 10 Lodha women.
- In the absence of schools during lockdown, the tailoring course was availed of, by the young girls, which benefitted them.
- One Lodha house was made a centre for the children to study and learn.
- Lodha women and men were taken to the health sub centre for the 1st vaccination for covid 19.
- Subsequently, the Lodha learning centre was made a vaccination centre for the 2nd dose of covid 19 vaccine.
- The childrens' parliament group was initiated. Along with the other children, this parliament brought to the fore, child rights and child protection issues. The children were given sessions from time to time to make them aware of their rights.
- The exposure to the outer world changed their perspectives and life style and this was reflected in some of them, who became more organized in the community.

### **Monitoring and Evaluation**

#### **Activities**

Learning support to the children

No. of Activities: In 9 months from April,2021 to March, 2022, a total of 210 days, learning support was provided to the children.

**Outcome:** Teaching is a great profession. Just as there is great social respect in teaching, it has also a role to play in building an ideal society. One can keep oneself busy in education for the rest of one's life. There is a different kind of joy in knowledge gaining and in keeping others abreast.

· Admission of children in the Lodha centre

**No. of Activities:** During this year, total number of 22 (boys 8, girls 7 including 5 Lodha) children were admitted to the Lodha learning centre. The total number of beneficiary children was 154 in the centre.

**Outcome:** The trust and faith of the guardians have increased on the education style of the centre.

· Admission of children in government schools.

**No. of Activities:** A total of 15 children (boys 8, girls 7 including Lodha children) were admitted to government schools from the Lodha community Centre for the continuation of their further studies.

Outcome: The children will continue to pursue academics for their future.

Home visit

No. of Activities: For 25 days door to door visits of Lodha and general families were conducted. This amounted to a total of 350 houses in the year.

Outcome: Follow-up was done on children through home visits. Changes have been noticed in the general physical and mental development, especially among Lodha members.



#### Visit to Lodhapara

No. of Activities: The field staff visited Lodhapara, two days a week to implement the programme, with Lodha families.

Outcome: Constant visits have brought immense change in the community.

#### • Health check up camps

No. of Activities: During this year, a total number of 22 (boys 8, girls 7 including 5 Lodha) children were admitted to the Lodha learning centre.

Total number of beneficiary children was 154 at the centre.

**Outcome:** Medical camp is considered a life-saving programme. The aim was to provide free medical treatment to the poor and to the Lodha community, living in rural areas by a mobile team with various medical specialized services. The medical camp enriched all with constructive learning outcomes:

- Some of them communicated that they wanted homoeopathy treatment but did not know where to report for the same.
- Many patients reported that they had benefited with homoeopathic treatment in some medical conditions but had limited access to public health system from where homoeopathic treatment was offered.
- Some of the patients wanted to know for which diseases in patients was homeopathy care available.

  By participating in awareness and medical camps, people were shown the advantages and disadvantages of disease prevention.

#### · Monthly staff meeting

No. of Activities: A total of 15 staff meetings were held.

Outcome: A regular staff meeting was held every month for the implementation of the Lodha project. In addition, quarterly, half-yearly, annual and emergency meetings were organized time to time.

#### · Awareness programme on health & hygiene

No. of Activities: Total of 4 awareness programmes on health and hygiene camps were held. Total participants were 173 with 84 males and 89 females.

Outcome: 1. Earlier, the Lodha parents were reticent but now the Lodha community unhesitatingly appeal to the administration about their demands or needs and dare to speak out.

2. All in the Lodha community regularly attended medical and awareness camps and meetings. They always joined the sessions following the rules of lockdown.

#### Awareness programmes on government schemes

No. of Activities: 2 times. Participants 68 (male 8 female 60).

Outcome: 1. Lodha parents were reluctant to reach out to people. At present the Lodha community, voice their demands and needs and freely communicate with the people themselves.

2. Mothers of the Lodha community were eager to open savings bank accounts to get government benefits.

#### Identification of needy families for providing grocery support during lock down and after the cyclone Yaas.

No. of Activities: 160 needy families were identified after cyclone Yaas

Outcome: A list consisting of names was drawn out after short listing the 160 heads. The cyclone Yaas adversely affected beneficiaries in four villages of Radhakrishnapur & Naraharipur Mouza. The emergency response for Yaas relief goods for the Lodha community and others at the administrative level, registered CBOs. Rudrangar Rishalaxmi club were provided meals at home, during this shut down period.





#### Learning centre was converted into a disaster shelter camp during cyclone Yaas on 25th and 26th May 2021

No. of Activities: 120 families (members 450) took shelter in the learning centre. On 26th May, after the cyclone, 1200 people (male 500 female 700) were given cooked food from the centre.

Outcome: The practise of service in the times of natural calamities was inculcated.

#### Parents' meeting

No. of Activities: Total Participants 57 (male 2 Female 55)

Outcome: The parents were made aware of the covid 19 prevention protocols.

 Collaboration with Rudranagar Palli Unnyan Tarun Songho, Rudranagar Gram Panchayet, Ramkrishna Mission & Saraswati Milan Mela Committee

No. of Activities: 4 organizations

Outcome: The local clubs became the strength for resource generation.

#### · Packing of relief kits

No. of Activities: 670 packets were packed

Outcome: The team learnt to sacrifice their time and energy for the sake of the people.

#### • TLM & Clothes Distribution

No. of Activities: 154 children (boys-86, girls-68)

Outcome: It increased the enthusiasm of the children to come to the centre to learn.

#### Awareness Programmes on child rights.

No. of Activities: A total of 3 (dates – 19.11.2021, 21.11.2021 and 04.03.2022) awareness programmes on child rights and child protection issues have been held. Total participants – 359 with 106 males and 253 females.

**Outcome:** For the first time, the children of the entire Sagar Island came to know about child rights. Prior to this, they never had this type of training sessions.









#### Child parliament meeting

**No. of Activities:** A total 10 Child Parliament meeting was conducted. There was a total of 450 participants with 130 males and 320 females.

**Outcome:** 1. As a result of conducting child rights awareness camps and monthly parliament etc, children from the Lodha and other communities were becoming aware of their rights and child protection issues.

2. The children of the centre have submitted a written application to the BDO and Panchayet Pradhan, requesting for social development work in their villages.

#### Childrens' leaders meeting

No. of Activities: A total of 5 Monthly Childrens' Leader Meetings were organized in this year. (Dates: 30.07.2021, 20.09.2021, 10.11.21, 21.11.21 and 04.03.2022). Parliament leader participants in the project area were 163 (males 40 and females 123).

Outcome: The children became vocal and are raising their voice for their rights.

#### Periodic leadership workshop for child leaders

**No. of Activities:** Number of Leadership Workshops with parliament leaders were 5 and they were conducted on 14.08.2021, 29.08.2021, 18.09.21, 26.10.21 and 18.12. 21 and 26.01.2022 There were a total of 161 heads with 53 male and 108 females.

**Outcome:** As a result of several awareness camps on child laws and rights, protection issues, the children and their parents become much more aware. Self-leadership skills among children. As a spiralling effect of school closure for pandemic lock down, the parents took the initiative to send the school dropouts back to school.

#### Formation of child parliament

**No. of Activities:** This year, 4 child parliaments were formed in the Radhakrishnapur and the Naraharipur areas.

**Outcome:** After the formation of the parliament, the children became aware of their rights and have shown courage.

Children of Shishu Sangsad are playing a special role in preventing child marriages.



#### • Legal entitlements

No. of Activities: During this year, Aadhaar card (Unique Identification Authority of India) was made for 24 people (males-11; females-13). 2 job cards, and ration cards for 12 persons (with 5 males and 7 females) were issued to the Lodhas. Savings bank accounts for 10 Lodha mothers were opened in State Bank of India.

Outcome: These identity cards ensured the proof of their presence and relevance in the community.

#### Community survey

No. of Activities: On one occasion, in the Santali Community at Jibantala Village under Rudranagar GP.

Outcome: The beginning of the year a survey of 30 families was done in the Santali Community in Jibantala Village under Rudranagar GP. This survey gave the full details of each family. The survey was conducted to know the livelihood, social and economic status of the Santals.

#### • Networking and collaboration with the local panchayat

No. of Activities: 20 times

Outcome: The panchayat was made aware of the needs of the Lodha people.

#### · Sports day celebration

No. of Activities: The annual sports competition was held at RadhakrishnapurTankpar playground of Khelaghar Learning on 10thand 11th November, 2021. About 165 people (M - 75, F - 90) were present for the event.

Outcome: Compared to previous years, most of the winners in the annual sports competition held in 2021 were from the Lodha community



#### Tailoring course for women

**No. of Activities:** A total of 20 girls including children participated in the tailoring class. This class was conducted two times a week at the Lodha Centre from September 2021 to December 2021.

**Outcome:** Out of 20 students, 14 passed. During the lockdown, young girls were interested to take up the tailoring course.

## Networking with local health administration for institutional delivery

No. of Activities: 20 visits to the government hospital were made for networking.

**Outcome:** The mothers' were now getting admitted to hospitals for child delivery.

#### Barefoot teacher's training programme

No. of Activities: Two days (11th and 12th February, 2022) teacher's training programme part 2 was held with the local teachers of the government and private schools. Total participants were 36 that included 7 males and 29 females.

Outcome: It opened a window for the future training programmes.

#### · Follow up visit to the hostel

No. of Activities: This year there were 4 follow up visits to Adibasi Hostel at the Patharpratima Block. Outcome: It gave a sense of love and care to the 15 children who were in the hostel.

#### Inclusion of Lodhas in government scheme – Duare Sarkar No. of Activities: • 10 Lodha mothers were getting Rs. 500 per month in Lakshmi Bhandar.

- 10 families were recipients of the health card through which they were now eligible to get free government medical facility up to Rupees 5 lakh.
- 3 aged Lodha members were given old age pension under a government scheme.

**Outcome:** 1. Their confidence in KMWSC and the government increased after 10 Lodha women received money every month from the Lakshmi Bhandar under the Government Scheme.

2. Lodha community members benefitted from the government scheme through the health card.

In case of serious illness, it is now convenient for them to get treatment using that card.

3. After receiving the allowance for the elderly, they were able to have enough timely food. With that, they have noticeably undergone positive physical changes.



# Solar Enlightenment & Community Empowerment Project

Sundarban, the stretch of mangrove land, protected by the UNESCO as a world heritage site has an eco system which is diverse and complex. Forest area away from human population remains a tussle-a relationship of being a friend and a foe. At present, KMWSC is working in the remote villages of Gosaba Block under the Canning Sub-division of South 24 pgs. Gosaba is one of the main deltaic islands in the Sundarban region, bounded by the Vidyadhari, Matla and Zilli rivers connecting to Bay of Bengal. The pandemic and natural calamities have had an adverse impact on the livelihood of village families. They have broken the backbone of the income generation opportunities. The remote villages have been crippled by the natural calamities such as cyclones and floods every year in the remotest areas of Sundarbans. Their cultivations are being destroyed, the ponds are filled with salty water and thus, fishery is at stake. In monsoons, for months there is no electricity. The high and low tide affected people's life style and have conditioned their activities. The families live disadvantageous situation; they are struggling everyday for survival as they are cut off from the main land. Elderly and children remain the most vulnerable and they face difficulties in darkness. Often, they are bitten by poisonous snakes as Sundarban villages are known for these venomous snakes. The transportation and communication systems are very poor in the villages. They have no other profession except farming and catching fish from the rivers. The medical facilities are located so far that it is beyond the reach of the common village people. KMWSC assembles solar lanterns to distribute among the cyclone affected and the needy families for their daily lightening in the houses. KMWSC is generating for survival and sustenance, a source of family income of 45 SHG members by providing chicks for farming and seeds of vegetables, for kitchen gardening.



# **Pandemic and Disaster Management**



## A silent killer - cyclone Yaash

As the state of West Bengal was fighting covid 19 and battling the after-effects of the super cyclone Amphan, another silent killer, cyclone Yaash hit the state, in the month of May 2021 and caused great havoc in the lives of people. The silent rise of the water level destroyed the livestock of the families. With the rise in the sea level, the banks broke and water entered the village houses and completely destroyed the edible things stocked. The families took shelter in temporary constructions with tarpaulin sheets and tents which were pitched at an elevated level. People evacuated their respective houses with barely enough to sustain the household. Countless families waited invain on the river banks for food, water and clothes. It was at this juncture, that, KMWSC, in response to cyclone Yaash, reached out to 500 cyclone affected families with groceries, essentials, food supply and relief kits from Kolkata.

Oxygen Concentrators were Inaugurated at Sangharmpur Shibati G.P - Basirhat, Sonagachi - Kolkata, Gosaba - Sunderbans, in the presence of the Gram Panchayat Pradhan and the stakeholders. Owing to the massive rise in the numbers of the covid 19-second wave patients, this was the need of the hour. Thus, oxygen storage at the field level was installed. The location was identified, keeping in mind, the vulnerability of the location and the beneficiaries.









### **Covid** - 19

With the covid-19 pandemic continuing in India, the impact reached the remotest of the country.

Impact of covid-19 on people's livelihoods, their health and our food systems

The covid-19 pandemic has led to a dramatic loss of human life worldwide and presents an unprecedented challenge to public health, food systems and the world of work. The economic and social disruption caused by the pandemic is devastating: tens of millions of people are at risk of falling into extreme poverty, while the number of undernourished people magnified. India is now at the nascent stage of endemic where the country is learning to live with the virus but the impact of the pandemic has led to a drastic change in the socio-economic conditions



of life, at large. Regaining sustainable family income generation is a greater challenge now. With this pandemic crisis still at large, it will still take a few years to come back to normal life.

In the second wave of pandemic, India was crippled, due to the lack of, infrastructure and the scarcity of hospital equipments, health kits, medicines and oxygen cylinders.

#### Intervention of KMWSC

As the pandemic spread to the remotest parts of the country, the most affected were the poor, the marginalized and migrant families; families living in the slums, pavement dwellers, mothers in the red-light areas, the tribal and the daily wage earners and the village families. KMWSC was committed to reach out to every family it worked with.











### **Staff Vaccination**

On Saturday 5th June 2021, Loreto Elliot Road School in collaboration with the Techno India Group, Salt Lake. organised a vaccination camp, on the school premises for, all their stake holders, beneficiaries and elderly systers Director of KMWSC, Sr Monica Suchiang, the faculty members, the KMWSC staff and for their family members. All were given a dose of the Covishield Vaccine at a time when getting immunized was next to impossible. The KMWSC family remains grateful for the support and thanks Sr. Kaspar Clara, the Principal of Loreto Day School, Elliot Road for the inoculation camp.



### **Blanket Distribution**



In collaboration with the Cafe and Bakery unit, the food ATM was initiated to serve the needy and to stand with them in their fight against hunger. Fresh, hot, nutritious cooked food, maintaining proper hygiene and packaging, keeping the social distancing norms, was provided to more than 100 beneficiaries two times a week. A monthly survey on the quality, quantity and type of food being provided through the food ATM was conducted by personally meeting the beneficiaries in all areas. Their feedback and suggestions were collected and studied. Thereafter, according to those, further initiatives were introduced and the measures were taken forward.

Thus, this initiative was taken by Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre to support the needy covid patients and their families who were suffering from hunger crisis.

On the day of the inauguration, Sr. Flora and all the sisters of Loreto Entally graced the event with their presence. Fr. Patrick presided over the rituals and Sr. Flora, Sr. Geraldine and the Entally Community joined all, for the inauguration.

KMWSC remains thankful to Sri Abdulla Sana, Officer in charge of Entally Police Station, who conveyed his telephonic best wishes to the Director, Sr Monica Suchiang for this endeavour.



Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre has been serving the less privileged brothers and sisters since 2014 through various social development projects. India was going through difficult times then, number of COVID positive patients in the city was rising on a daily basis, confining citizens to their homes. KMWSC as a socially responsible organization chose to venture out and help the COVID affected and quarantined patients by providing freshly cooked meals for them and their families. The effort of the organization helped these families not to remain hungry when they were incapacitated. This effort of providing meals to Covid patients was named as KMWSCares. As a giving gesture, each staff contributed and that brought in the bounty.







KMWSC had a daily target of 230 meals. KMWSC is thankful to the Loreto Congregation for providing an ambulance, which was used to deliver the food to the COVID infected patients and families. Whilst this was done, KMWSC ensured the safety of the staff involved in such operations.

The organization developed a Standard Operating Procedure for its frontline workers to keep them safe as they went out to serve the complimentary meals to the beneficiaries. With the collaboration of the Kolkata Municipal Corporation, KMWSC reached out to the economically disadvantaged 230 covid patients and their families who lived in the KMC Safe Home beside Science City.

## The hope for the future - Zero discrimination day

The day aims to promote "Equality before law" and in practice, it is promoted in all the member countries of the UN. In North 24 parganas, a drawing competition was organised under the Brickfield School Project at the Resource Centre in Itinda Ferry Ghat. Another drawing competition was held with the children of the brickfield schools in Kalyani. At the brickfields in Akra, South 24 Parganas, the children put up solo and group dance performances. The teachers danced to the OBR theme song "Break The Chain". The child rights project team organised a cultural programme at Itinda Panitor Girls' High School. Child club members staged a spectacular drama on Women Empowerment. Members of the local Panchayat and the Block Administration witnessed the programme. The anti human trafficking (AHT) team of Basirhat observed the day with OBR's subject line followed by drawing competitions, recitations, dance and prize distribution. The AHT Diamond Harbour team conducted a drawing competition on the theme of Women's safety at Chaul Gola, under Lotus Child project, the programme started with a prayer followed by singing, group dance, mass awareness on sanitary distribution, napkin and drama on menstrual taboo and cutting the OBR cake.



At Ganga Sagar, the day was observed at the Lodha Learning Centre under the Lodha Community Project, in the presence of honourable guests of honour representing the local administration, school and the health centre. The children put up a cultural programme through dances, skit and the song rendition of the OBR theme song. In Kolkata, under the red light project, the adolescent group danced to the OBR theme song while the mother's group took part in an art competition. MAC children of the Hidden Domestic Child Labour project presented dance, poetry, poster making on the OBR theme. Solar project at Sundarban spreads the message of OBR among the residents in remote areas—

### **Chronicles**

#### **Brickfield School Project**

**Mamuni Parvin**, aged 11, is the daughter of Abdul Rashid Mondal and Khadeja Bibi. The family is a permanent resident of Budo Jirakpur village of Basirhat Subdivision in North 24 parganas. Driven by poverty and lack of income opportunity in their native village, the family migrated to Protima brickfield in Basirhat in search of livelihood, where the family is presently engaged as labourers in the brick layering process.

Before migrating to Protima brickfield, Mamuni used to study in Gokna Sri Gobindapur Primary School near her native village from where she completed her studies up to Class IV. Once the family migrated to Protima, the girl started helping her parents in the brick layering process owing to dire financial needs of the family. Thus, Mamuni dropped out of school after Class IV.

Our team identified Mamuni and her family through the survey conducted in Protima brickfield in October 2021. When they came to know that the girl had studied up to Class IV, they immediately enrolled her at our brickfield school in Protima. Right from the beginning, Mamuni displayed a keen interest in studies and attended classes on a regular basis. She picked up her lessons very fast. As she had studied up to class IV, the teachers began to provide her with lessons as per the syllabus of Class V.

In March this year (2022), when the new session began in government schools, teachers of the Protima Brickfield School and Lead Teachers of Basirhat visited Bhabyla Lady Mukherjee Girls' High School, also in Basirhat, with a quest to secure admission for Mamuni in Class VI. The school authorities interviewed Mamuni and were satisfied with her knowledge and her particulars including age conformed to the admission criteria of class VI. However, on examining Mamuni's Transfer Certificate, they pointed out some errors which prevented the girl's admission, in a High School. Hearing this, our Lead Teachers immediately visited Mamuni's primary school near her native village. Initially, the authorities of the primary school refused to make the necessary rectifications in Mamuni's transfer certificate. After several rounds of discussions and requests, our team persuaded them for a telephonic conversation with the authorities of the High School. After a prolonged discussion between authorities of the two schools, the Gokna Sri Gobindapur Primary School made the necessary rectifications and issued a fresh Transfer Certificate in favour of Mamuni Parvin.

The next day, our Lead Teachers brought Mamuni and her mother to Bhabyla Lady Mukherjee Girls' High School along with the rectified Transfer Certificate. The Teacher-in-Charge of the school spoke to Mamuni's mother and was convinced that the mother too, was eager to get her daughter educated. After verifying the Transfer Certificate and completing other formalities, Mamuni Parvin, was admitted to Class VI in Bhabyla Lady Mukherjee Girls' High School.

Within seven days of securing admission, Mamuni was provided with books and school uniform by her school. The girl has been attending her new school in her new uniform and with her new books. At present, Pravin's mother wants her daughter to complete her education and secure a respectable job instead of becoming another migrant labourer like herself



#### **Hidden Domestic Child Labour Project**



During the door to door survey, the HDCL Staff found out that a 17 year old Manoj Bhuiya with hearing impairment, lived with other 3 family members, in Muraripukur Road, Ultadanga (Ward no-32). His father worked as a driver and his mother worked as domestic help. After the survey, the HDCL staff admitted him at the Muraripukur MAC. During daily classes, the MAC teachers observed that the child possessed various creative qualities and was a quick learner.

After a few days, the MAC teacher admitted Manoj in a government school (Ideal school for Deaf) in class IV. Meanwhile, the HDCL staff also visited the State Commissioner for Persons with Disability to discuss about Manoj. After a lengthy discussion, they agreed to provide the "Manobi Scholarship" to Manoj. Conforming to the department quidelines, the HDCL staff filled up the scholarship form and collected all the supporting documents and submitted them to the department. After a thorough scrutiny of the documents submitted, Manoj was recommended to receive the "Manobi Scholarship". From February 2022, Manoj started to receive the scholarship. According to Manoj's mother, the scholarship helped them to afford the education for Manoj.



#### **Solar Enlightenment Project**

Shila Gayen, a 14 year old child, a student of Manmathanagar High School, of class VI resides 5 kms away from her school and stays with her 65 year old grandmother at the Manmathanagar Island under Gosaba block. Her father's demise 4 years back, her mother's re-marriage and her subsequent leaving the house, compelled Shila to be living with her grandmother who was old and infirm and could not earn a living. Krishna, her elder married sister lived in the same village and worked as a helper on the farms. From the income she earned, Krishna assisted in Shila's education. At present, Shila and her grandmother are dependent on the monthly ration they get and on

the old-age allowance that her grandmother gets from the government. Shila aims to continue with higher studies and looks after her grandmother. Due to power cuts of 15-20 hours a day, she was unable to study. Not only this aspect but the very fact that her grandmother was distressed to spend nights after nights in complete darkness due to the fear of wild animals like snakes, foxes, insects etc. during load-shedding, was a great matter of concern in safety issues. On hearing this, the KMWSC field animators visited their house and found them in a pitiable condition. They were in constant touch with the family and guided them for food and old age schemes. KMWSC provided them a solar lantern on behalf of the organization. Shila was overjoyed to receive a solar lantern for her studies. She was thankful to KMWSC for providing her with a ray of hope in the form of illumination for her studies. Shila's grandmother was grateful for the procurement of the Old-Age government allowance scheme from which she was receiving aid every month. The grandmother thanked the KMWSC team for helping them out in their time of hardships and struggles. "My granddaughter and I are very grateful to you. For the first time in my life, I am getting light whenever I want, for our daily chores and my granddaughter studies in the same light in the evening, when I cook".



#### **Skill Development Project**

Name: Sumana Giri

Age: 25 years

**Qualification:** 12th Pass

#### "I didn't realize, I made such a big mistake."

Sumana, a 25 year old woman now, had unknowingly got into a child marriage at a very tender age. She got married in the 10th standard with the love of her life going against her family. None had accepted their marriage. Her husband supported her while she completed her schooling but when she was appearing for her 12th examination, she conceived. During the time of her pregnancy, she realized some behavioural changes in her husband. She gave birth to a baby boy but the strange behavior of her husband continued and he had started to ignore Sumana even more. After few years, Sumana came to know that her husband was involved in an extramarital affair. She was emotionally devastated and could not fathom why it happened and what her plan of action would be. Her pleas to convince him to break the relationship went in vain. She stayed there for 5 years facing the struggles and turmoil all by herself. Her helplessness compelled her to knock on her parent's doors and they, despite all odds parents supported her. Sumana complied with their advise of getting out of the dysfunctional marriage, leave her marital home and shift in with her parents. Her in-laws and husband didn't even allow her to take her son with her. While she was staying with her parents, she came to know, about the Beautician Course under the Skill Development Project of Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre (KMWSC). She expressed her interest to join the course and thus took admission there Being attentive, she learned all the techniques very well and successfully completed the 3 months course. She was certified on 30th of March, 2022 at KMWSC holding the first position in the batch and made everyone proud. As said by Sumana, "I have gained confidence in myself. I understand the importance of not turning back to my old life and would like to do something for my son and for myself with what I have learned."





#### **Child Rights' Project**

Name: Reshmi Khatun (Name Changed)

**Age and Sex:** 07 years (Female) **Class:** Il at Nakuadaḥa F.P School

A child club member of Akharpur had given KMWSC, the information on a seven year old girl child namely Reshmi Khatun (name changed), a class II student of Nakuadaha F.P School was a resident of Itinda village of class II. After intervention, it came to light that the child was sexually abused by her neighbour namely Reyal Gazi, aged 60 years, whom she used to call "Grandpa". The child used to go to the accuser's house time to time to play. According to the child, that day in the afternoon 'Grandpa' took her to play on the roof and sexually abused her. He threatened the child not to tell anything to her family members or anybody regarding the matter. On her return to the house, her mother noticed some abnormality in her behaviour and soon came to know about the matter when the girl revealed the incident. Her narration was tearful and replete with fear. Subsequently, her mother informed the matter to other family members. Neighbours were kept abreast of the same. The child club members advised the mother to go to the police station. Meanwhile, on getting this information, KMWSC appraised the Itinda Panitor Sangsad member of this matter. With the help of Sangsad member, the mother along with the child went to Basirhat Police station to file an FIR against the person. Despite the child being scared, she explained everything to the police. An FIR was lodged against the perpetrator at Basirhat P.S. Police rescued the child and completed the medical examination. The child was produced before CWC and after the consent of the child and her parents, the CWC decided to keep her in her own house. Soon after lodging of an FIR, the police went to arrest the accused but by then, he had fled. The perpetrator is still absconding. KMWSC visited Basirhat the child is staying at her own house. The child since then has been associated with the child club and the other members are helping her to cope with this traumatic experience.

#### **Redlight Project**

Daughter of a sex worker, **Baishakhi Halder**, (Name Changed) aged 8 years, lived in Sonagachi, a redlight area and studied in the KMWSC MAC centre since the last 3 years. Frequently, when her mother was occupied with clients in the room, the child was sent by untrustworthy neighbours on errands like purchasing pan masala / snacks / alcohol / citrates / drugs / condoms etc for their client. Being in an unsafe neighbourhood, Baisakhi was vulnerable to sexual exploitation, substance abuse, domestic violence. Several times, attempts were made to brainwash and influence her to join the flesh trade like her mother.

Baisakhi was averse to these things and would get upset and anxious seeing the things happening around her. She loved studying and disliked it when her, studying time in her room, was interrupted and she was asked to go out on work. It was becoming very difficult for her to concentrate on academics. With this troubling her, she vented her thoughts and fears and expressed her desire to study with the KMWSC teachers.

In this situation, KMWSC took the initiative and arranged for a rainbow home admission for her. Now she is happy in the childrens' home and studies in class II. KMWSC is hopeful that she will be able to reach her future goal and will be successful in establishing her identity with respect & dignity.



**Sohini Das**, (name changed), a sex worker under the red-light project was in debt due to the covid-19 lockdown, when she had to rely only on her savings. She was unable to provide a proper meal for her children. Due to the intervention of the redlight project staff, Sohini's son was already admitted in the hostel but her daughter, aged 10 years was living with her in Sonagchi.

Sohini was always under great stress thinking of her daughter's well-being and safety. Whilst she realised how unsafe the environment was, at Sonagachi, she also knew that she was not in any position to leave the flesh trade right then. Thus, Sohini shared her concern with the realight project staff and with the support from the Rainbow Homes, her daughter was admitted to the Rainbow Home at Dharamtala.

Mena Laha (Name Changed) ,one of the sex workers under the Redlight project area wanted to leave the trade but stopped every time thinking about her daughter's future. She wanted to give her daughter a good upbringing and education. To do the latter, she needed money and she realised that she had no other way to earn it. Mena shared her ordeal with the project team and after several counselling sessions with her and her daughter, she was ready to move out of Sonagachi, leaving the flesh trade .Her daughter had secured admission at the Rainbow Home in Dharamtala.



#### Anti human trafficking project

One of the child parliament members from the Anti human trafficking project at Basirhat shared with the project team that one of the girls from his village, who was 16 years old had eloped with her boyfriend. He added that, not only the boy she fled with was notorious, but the child's parents were completely at a loss and felt helpless. The KMWSC staff were taken to the girl's home for their guidance and for their subsequent follow-up with the law enforcement department for this case. The girl was finally rescued and as per the Child Welfare Committee order, she is staying at the government home for further social investigation to enable her to reintegrate into the society

During one of the child parliament meetings, two of our child parliament members shared with the anti human trafficking project team that one of their friends was missing. They took the project team to her house where the family shared that she was, of late, behaving very differently. On checking her phone it was summarised that the new friends she had made, convinced her to meet up with them. It was from that moment that she went missing. With assistance from the project team, the family continued following up with the law enforcement and finally, she was rescued.

#### Survivors' programme under anti human trafficking project

Il-year-old girl raped, mutilated with sticks shoved in private parts, was left to die, bleeding. The anti human trafficking project team got the information about a missing child. The next day, the kid was found by the parents and the villagers unconscious near the village water body where she was dumped. Her condition was woeful and she was bleeding profusely from her private parts. There were serious multiple injuries- both physically visible and internally. She was first taken to the local hospital but owing to her deteriorating condition, she was rushed to a city hospital.

The KMWSC team met with the local police for a follow up. The case was registered under the POCSO Act and the rapist was arrested along with one of the relatives of the girl who played a key part in luring the girl out of her house. Anti human trafficking project team was in constant touch with the medical team, law enforcement department and the parents of the girl. After multiple major surgeries, she is out of danger but suffered serious long term mental trauma and physical injuries. The girl is now under the protection of the state government and the anti human trafficking project team is also working on the rehabilitation plan, for the child to get her back to her normal life and put behind her, the trauma.



#### **Barefoot Project**

**Kunti Sarkar** (Name Changed), who is a sex worker in the Sonagachi area wanted to quit her profession. She wanted to do something with dignity for her 8 year old son. In that situation, she met one of the project staff, who worked in the same area as a community mobilizer in an education project and to her, she expressed her wish. The project team advised her to join the barefoot teachers' training programme for skill development. Her training commenced and she regularly came for the training from Sonagachi and successfully completed Level I and II training. After completion of training at KMWSC, she started to work as a teacher of the Sonagachi MAC centre which was run by Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre. Since then, she has been helping the children in their studies. Thus, she now is able to support her own family with dignity. She frequently participates in training programmes. Kunti remains grateful to Kolkata Mary Ward Social Centre for giving her an opportunity to work. Her respect and love for the trainers and KMWSC team for giving her a window to hone her abilities and capabilities is clearly evident.

The supervisor of Hidden Domestic Child Labour Project visited Siksha Niketan Girls' Primary School at Muraripukur for collecting information on mainstreaming of MAC children · Child Parliament Leaders, Monisha and Alamin of Child Rights project and Aritra of anti human trafficking project were handed over the Bravery Award, 2021 by Dr. Sashi Panja, Honorable Minister for the Department of Women and Child Development and Social Welfare of the Government of West Bengal for their courageous and selfless deeds.


